
The Uranium Mill Tailings Story

How uranium mill tailings may have ended up in your home.






Starting in the 1940s, sand-like radioactive leftovers from the milling process, called "mill tailings," were given away for free and used in construction of homes and businesses.

Uranium mill tailings can be found in Garfield, Gunnison, La Plata, Mesa, Moffat, Montrose and San Miguel counties. A cleanup program was conducted but some tailings still remain. CDPHE maintains records of these tailings.

Decide if you want to: Hire someone to remove the tailings

Remove the tailings yourself



- Use a dust mask.
- Wash hands & clothes.
- Don't eat, smoke, chew or drink while digging.
- Moisten soil to decrease chance of windblown tailings.
- Load the tailings into a truck, trailer or buckets.



Call us to come check the tailings removal.



We will visit your property to check that all tailings are removed. We will also update your property records.

Haul tailings to interim storage cell (by appointment only). While we work to establish an interim storage facility in Durango, you will need to take the uranium mill tailings to Grand Junction for disposal.

Tarp them to prevent windblown debris.



There is no disposal fee, but please call us 2-3 days prior between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. to schedule disposal.
